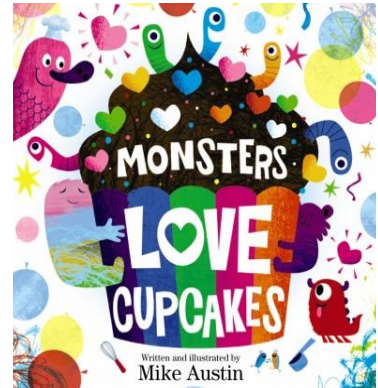
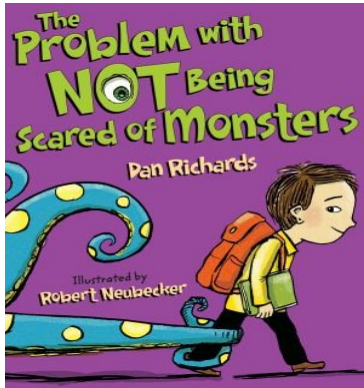
Five little monsters by the light of the moon

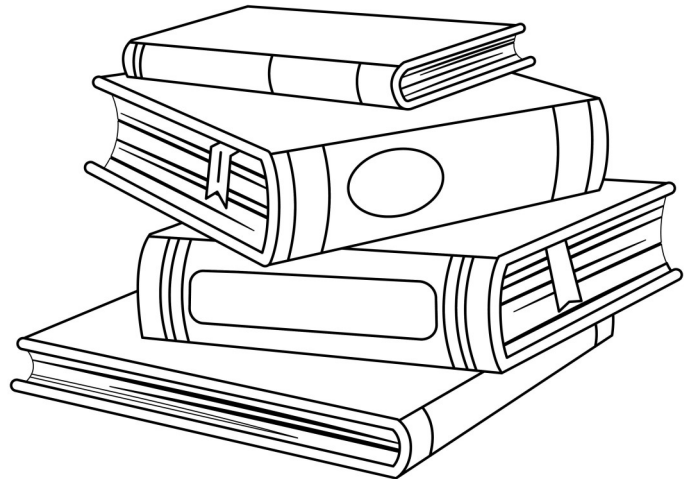
