## Every Child Ready to Read Skill

### **Singing**

• Singing helps with focus; vocabulary and phonic expansion; and predictability and cause & effect.

When you sing the same song to your baby or child over and over, they learn to expect what is coming next. For example, "After mom says 'with a one step, and a two step' she's gong to tickle me!"

Singing also helps with mathematical and spatial skills.

Music enhances brain development in areas tied to pattern recognition, counting, organization, time, and division of larger notes into smaller notes (i.e. fractions).
